

Young Nelson Mandela


Once upon a time, there was a young child called Rolihlahla Mandela. He was the child of a man, who worked for the king.

After his father died he stayed and worked at the great palace. He heard many stories of elders who were fighting for freedom, and hearing those stories inspired him to want to do the same thing.


The young boy soon became a young man, and that **inspiration** never went away. He went to college at the University College of Fort Hare but he got kicked out of school for joining a student protest.

He became very active in fighting for freedom and all people. During that time, Blacks and Whites were not treated equally. He fought against this but got into a lot of trouble for it. He went to **trial** for **treason** but he did not end up getting charged. However, in 1967 he was **accused** of going against the government and spent 27 years in prison.

That did not stop his work and **dedication**, and when he got out he continued to fight to end the issues between Black and White Africans. Years later, he won the Nobel Peace Prize and he became the first Black president of South Africa.



That young boy turned leader taught the world that no matter what happens, you can always make your dream come true.

Inspiration - something that makes someone want to do something or that gives someone an idea about what to do or create

Trial - a formal meeting in a court in which evidence about crimes, disagreements, etc., is presented to a judge and often a jury so that decisions can be made according to the law Treason - the crime of trying to overthrow your country's government or of helping your country's enemies during war

Accused - a person who is charged with a crime

Dedication - a feeling of very strong support for, or loyalty to someone or something


