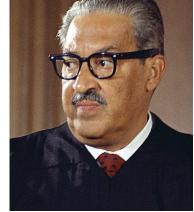

- an African American student could attend; he won this case in 1933.
- 7. He follows a person he looks up to and learns from, Charles Hamilton, to New York and gets the job of Chief Counsel for the NAACP.
- 8. He wins his first of 29 Supreme Court cases.
- **9.** After winning several **Supreme Court** cases he goes on to win a huge case: Brown v. Board of Education of Topeka, which stops legal **segregation**.
- 10. Wins 14 of the 19 cases he argues for the government in 1965.
- 11. Becomes first African American on the U.S. Supreme Court in 1967.

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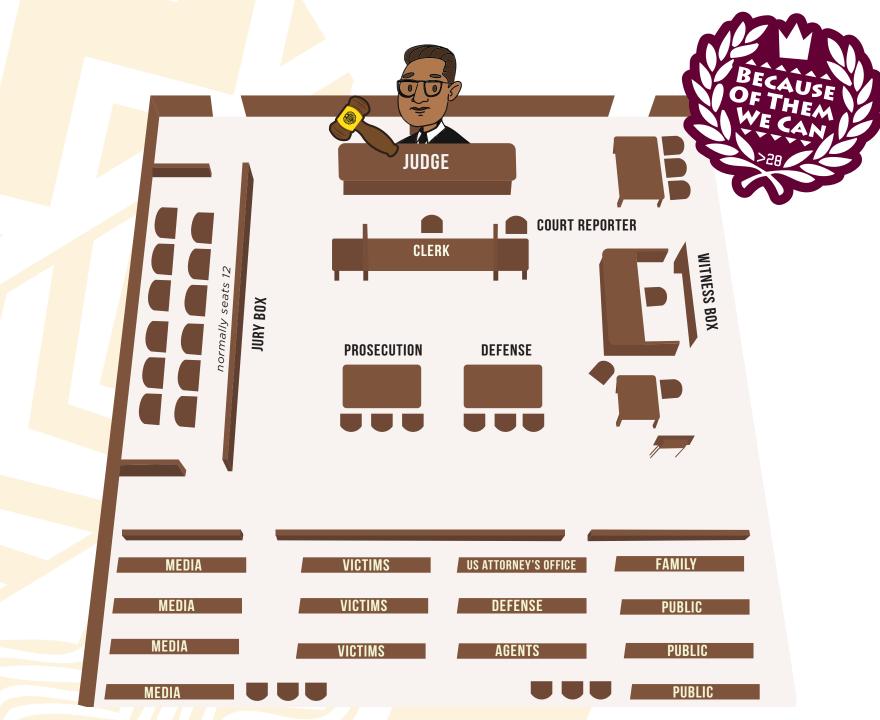
COUNTING IN THE COURTROOM

Perimeter: 15 + 10 + 15 + 10 = 50 ft

Segregation - the practice or policy of keeping people of different races, religions, etc., separate from each other



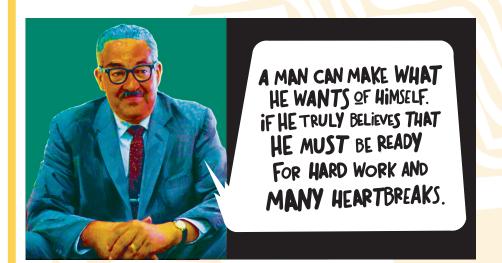
