

Directions: Review the timeline below of important information and dates about the life of Thurgood Marshall, who was the first African American **Supreme Court Justice**, the highest court in the U.S. He won 29 of the 31 cases he argued to the Supreme Court and was a key person that helped to end segregation. Once you have read through the timeline, answer the questions about his life, key details, and dates.

- 1. Thurgood Marshall is born in Baltimore, Maryland on July 2 in 1908.
- 2. Thurgood Marshall graduates high school in 1925 (by that time he had already read all of the Constitution because he was sent to read it when he got into trouble.)
- 3. He marries Vivian Burey in 1929.





Marshall in 1936


4. He graduates from Lincoln University in Oxford, Pennsylvania with honors and applies to the University of Maryland Law School. However, he is denied because he is Black, so he attends Howard University in 1930.



- 5. He graduates Howard as the top student in his class (valedictorian) and moves back to Baltimore where he starts his own law practice in 1933.
- 6. After working with the NAACP, he argues a major court case against the University of Maryland Law School so an African American student could attend he wins this case in 1933.
- 7. He follows his mentor Charles Hamilton to New York and is appointed the Chief Counsel for the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP).
- 8. He wins his first of 29 Supreme Court cases and is named the first Director-Counsel of NAACP Legal Defense Fund in 1940.
- 9. After winning several Supreme Court cases he goes on to win a huge case: Brown v. Board of Education of Topeka, which stops legal segregation.
- 10. Appointed circuit judge and makes 112 rulings, all of them later upheld by Supreme Court 1961-1965.
- 11. Appointed U.S. Solicitor General by President Lyndon Johnson; wins 14 of the 19 cases he argues for the government in 1965
- 12. Becomes first African American elevated to U.S. Supreme Court in 1967.



Supreme Court - the highest court of law in a country or U.S. state

Supreme Court Justice - One of nine attorneys that are on the highest court and make final decisions for other cases

Denied - to refuse to give (something) to someone : to prevent someone from having or receiving (something)

Valedictorian - the student who has the highest grades in a graduating class and who gives a speech at graduation ceremonies

Mentor - someone who teaches or gives help and advice to a less experienced and often younger person

Appointed - to choose (someone) to have a particular job : to give (someone) a position or duty

Segregation - the separation or isolation of a race, class, or ethnic group.

Elevated - to raise (someone) to a higher rank or level
